Utah for Rational Sex Offense Laws

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Introduction

Publication 2026-37 presents district-level registrant profiles for each member of the Utah Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice (LECJ) 2026 Interim Committee. These profiles were produced by Utah for Rational Sex Offense Laws (UTRSOL) in direct response to LECJ Interim Study Item 3, the committee's formal inquiry into what offense categories should qualify as registrable offenses under Utah law, adopted at the Legislative Management Committee vote on April 16, 2026. That item, proposed by the committee chairs themselves, represents the most substantive legislative examination of the Utah Sex, Kidnap, and Child Abuse Registry's scope in recent memory. UTRSOL's objective in producing this publication is to ensure that deliberations on Item 3 are grounded in accurate, district-specific data about the population those deliberations directly govern.

The Utah registry currently lists individuals convicted of a wide range of offenses — contact offenses against minors, contact offenses against adults, non-contact exploitation offenses including child sexual abuse material and enticing a minor, voyeurism, lewdness, indecent exposure, kidnapping with no sexual primary element, attempted offenses, and out-of-state convictions with no direct Utah equivalent. The practical consequence of this breadth is that a legislator's district contains registrants whose offense histories vary substantially — from aggravated contact crimes against young children to misdemeanor indecent exposure convictions predating current statute. These populations are not interchangeable in terms of risk profile, treatment responsiveness, or the public safety rationale for continued registration. Yet Utah's current registry treats them as administratively equivalent, imposing the same notification, residency, and compliance requirements regardless of offense type, elapsed time, or subsequent behavior.

UTRSOL's evidence-proportionality framework holds that the appropriate scope of a registration requirement should be calibrated to what the peer-reviewed evidence shows about that requirement's actual contribution to public safety, not to the intuitive severity of the original offense or to the political durability of expansive registry policy. Item 3 offers the LECJ committee an opportunity to apply exactly that standard: to examine whether Utah's current registrability criteria are drawn at the right line, and whether some categories of offense now on the registry warrant different treatment. The district profiles in this publication are designed to make that examination concrete and locally grounded. Each profile covers one legislative district represented on the LECJ committee and provides a structured descriptive picture of that district's confirmed registrant population drawn from the 2026 Utah Department of Public Safety (DPS) Sex, Kidnap, and Child Abuse

Registry dataset. Profiles are presented for fifteen districts spanning six counties and three geographic regions of the state: Weber County (SD3, SD4, HD6, HD7), Davis County (SD7, HD11, HD16, HD20), Salt Lake County (SD14, HD21, HD26, HD40), Washington County (SD29), Utah County (HD63), and a cross-county district spanning Salt Lake and Utah Counties (HD47). Together, these fifteen districts represent the full membership of the LECJ 2026 Interim Committee as constituted for the study period.

All quantitative data in this publication are derived directly from the 2026 DPS dataset and represent confirmed, address-verified registrants. UTRSOL performed offense categorization using statute descriptions contained in the DPS records, applying a consistent five-category taxonomy across all fifteen profiles: contact offense with a minor victim, contact offense with an adult or force element, non-contact and exploitation offenses, kidnapping with no sexual primary element, and other or unclassified. The non-contact and exploitation category, which includes sexual exploitation of a minor, child pornography possession and distribution, enticing a minor through electronic communication, voyeurism, lewdness, and indecent exposure, is presented with a detailed internal breakdown in each profile, as these offenses represent the category most directly implicated by Item 3 deliberations.

Compliance and community residency figures in each profile reflect DPS status codes, which measure subsequent sex offense conviction, not any subsequent criminal contact. This distinction is material: the recidivism figures reported here represent the most conservative available measure of reoffense, and readers should interpret them accordingly. Districts containing institutional addresses, including the Weber County Correctional Facility (WCCF), the Davis County Correctional Facility in Farmington, and the Utah State Correctional Facility (USCF) in Salt Lake City, are handled with explicit methodology notes. In those cases, institutional populations are identified, isolated, and excluded from community-residing metrics, which are then presented both with and without the correctional facility population to prevent misleading geographic concentration figures.

Each profile is intentionally bounded in scope. It describes who is registered within a given district, what offenses they carry, how long they have been registered, and where within the district they reside. No individual profile offers legal conclusions, policy recommendations, or cross-district comparisons. That analytical work, including series-level findings, offense category analysis, tenure and compliance patterns across the full committee geography, and the policy implications most directly relevant to Item 3, is reserved for Publication 2026-45, LECJ Interim Study Item 3: Cross-District Analysis and Analytical Supplement.

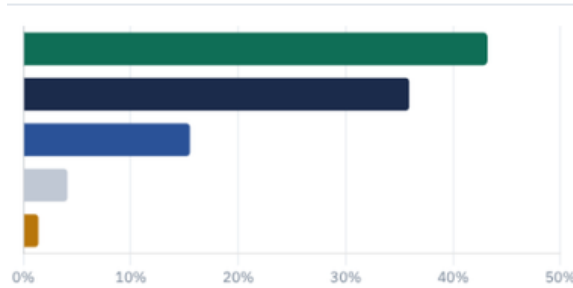

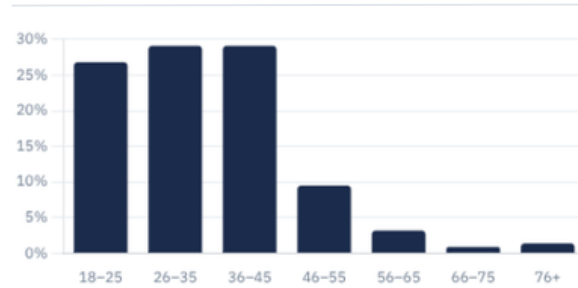

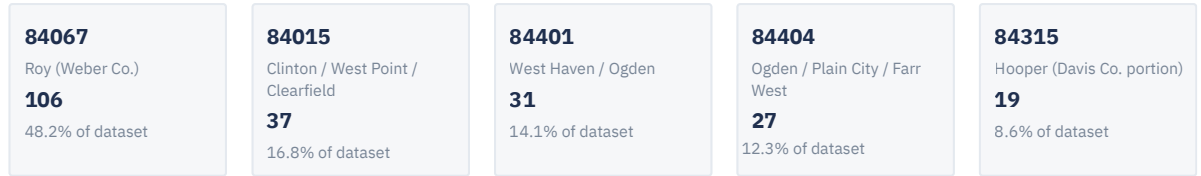

GENDER COMPOSITION



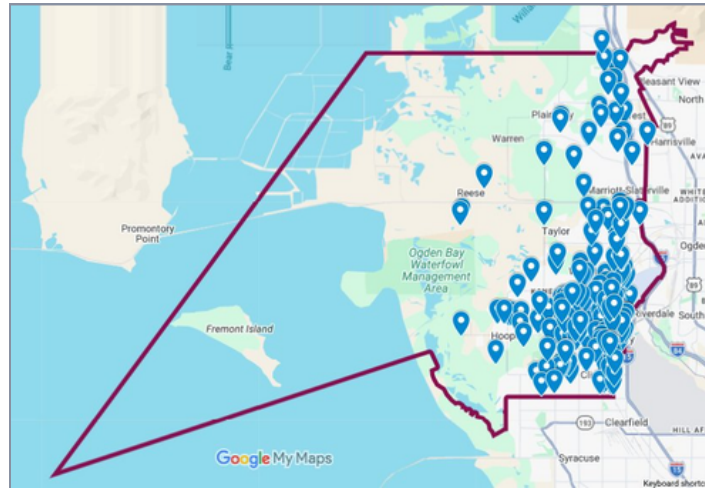
The district registry is overwhelmingly male. The 4 female registrants include 3 Weber County residents and 1 Davis County resident, with offense categories including unlawful conduct with a 16–17 year old (76-5-401.2), sexual exploitation of a minor, and out-of-state convictions.

DISTRICT GEOGRAPHY



Roy (84067) accounts for nearly half the confirmed dataset, consistent with its urban density and housing availability relative to the district's more rural western areas. The Hooper cluster (84315) lies in Davis County's portion of District 4.

GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION – DISTRICT 4



This map illustrates the residential distribution of individuals listed on Utah's Sex, Kidnap, and Child Abuse registry within Weber County. The concentration of registrants in specific corridors reflects constrained housing availability rather than individual preference — a pattern driven by affordability limitations, landlord restrictions, and the absence of coordinated housing support. UTRSOL's housing assistance data indicates that geographic clustering of this kind is a predictable outcome of current policy conditions, not an indicator of elevated community risk.

DATA SOURCES & METHODOLOGY NOTES

- All quantitative data in this profile (offense categories, age at offense, conviction state, ZIP distribution, registry tenure, gender, attempted offenses) are derived directly from the 2026 DPS dataset for Senate District 4 (n=220). This dataset represents confirmed, address-verified registrants.
- Offense categorization was performed by UTRSOL using statute descriptions from the DPS dataset. "Non-contact / exploitation" includes sexual exploitation of a minor, child pornography, enticing a minor, voyeurism, lewdness, indecent exposure, and electronic/online solicitation offenses. "Attempted" counts include any record with an attempted conviction among listed charges.
- Compliance/recidivism figures (91.0% compliant, 9.0% recidivated) and community residency figures (100.0% active, 0.0% incarcerated) are derived directly from 2026 DPS status codes for confirmed District 4 registrants. No registrants in this dataset carry an incarcerated status code. The DPS status code measures: a subsequent sex offense conviction, not any subsequent criminal contact.

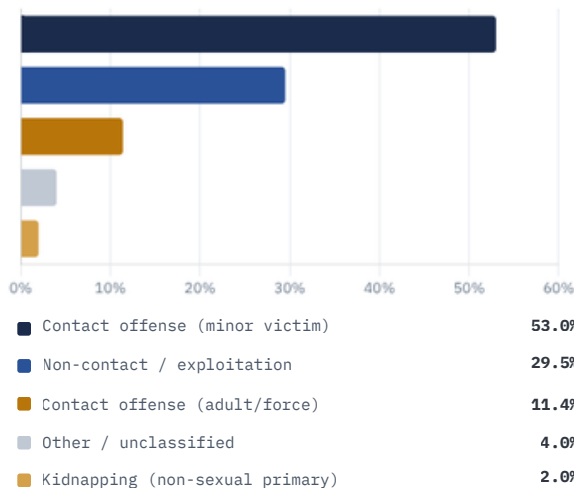

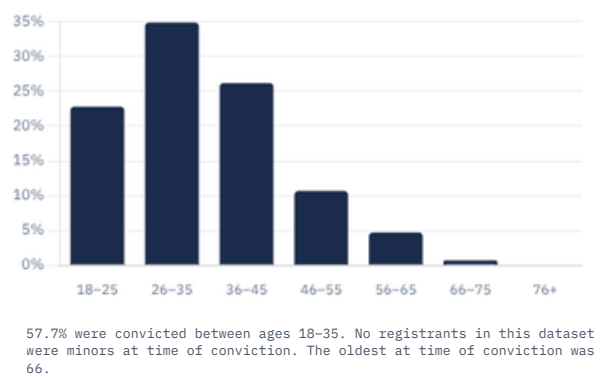

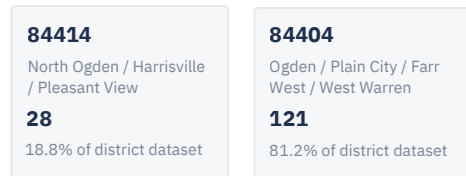

GENDER COMPOSITION



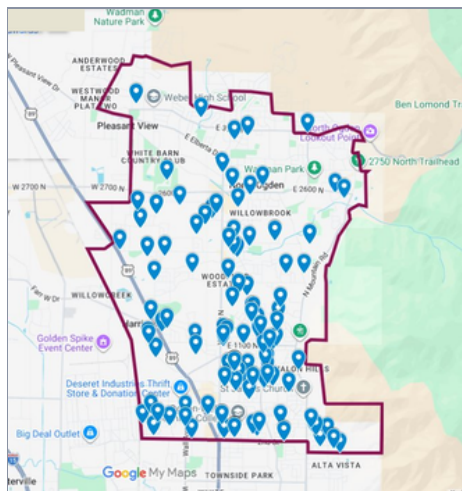
The district registry is overwhelmingly male. The 4 female registrants are all Weber County residents with offense categories including unlawful sexual activity with a minor (76-5-401), child abuse (76-5-109), and attempted aggravated sexual abuse of a child (76-5-404.1).

DISTRICT GEOGRAPHY



The 84404 corridor accounts for nearly three-quarters of District 7 registrants, consistent with its urban density and housing availability relative to the district's more suburban northern areas (84414).

GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION – DISTRICT 7



The concentration of registrants in specific corridors reflects constrained housing availability rather than individual preference — a pattern driven by affordability limitations, landlord restrictions, and the absence of coordinated housing support. UTRSOL's housing assistance data indicates that geographic clustering of this kind is a predictable outcome of current policy conditions, not an indicator of elevated community risk.

DATA SOURCES & METHODOLOGY NOTES

- All quantitative data in this profile (offense categories, age at conviction, conviction state, ZIP distribution, registry tenure, gender, attempted offenses) are derived directly from the 2026 DPS dataset for House District 7 (n=149). This dataset represents confirmed, address-verified registrants.
- Offense categorization was performed by UTRSOL using statute descriptions from the DPS dataset. "Non-contact / exploitation" includes sexual exploitation of a minor, child pornography, enticing a minor, voyeurism, lewdness, indecent exposure, and electronic/online solicitation offenses. "Attempted" counts include any record with an attempted conviction among listed charges.
- Compliance/recidivism figures (90.6% compliant, 9.4% recidivated) and community residency figures (99.3% active, 0.7% incarcerated) are derived directly from 2026 DPS status codes for confirmed House District 7 registrants. 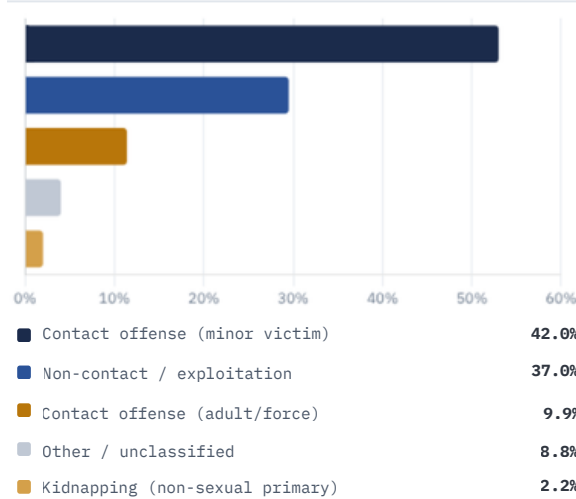

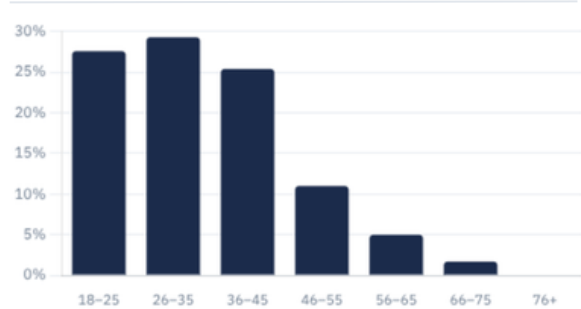

AGE AT TIME OF CONVICTION (N=181)

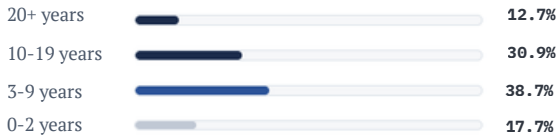

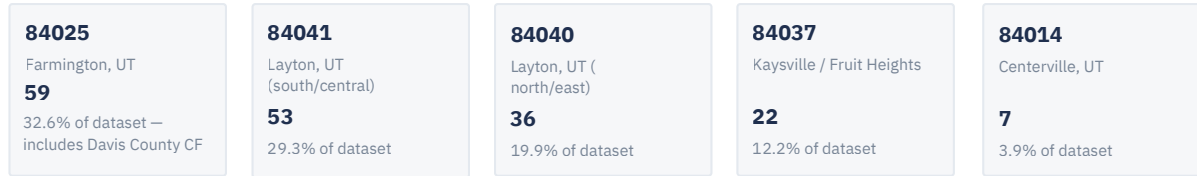

GENDER COMPOSITION



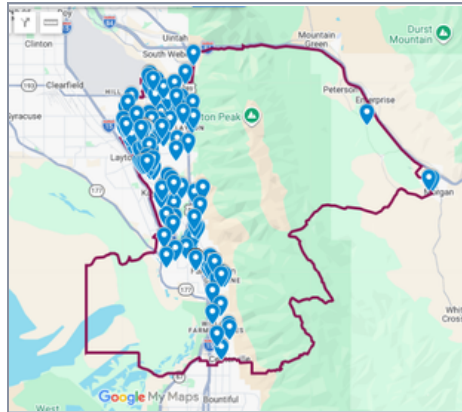
District 7 is the most male-skewed registry distribution in the UTRSOL LECJ series to date. The single female registrant carries a conviction for sexual abuse of a minor under Utah Code 76-5-401.1, a Class A misdemeanor.

DISTRICT GEOGRAPHY



Note on Farmington (84025): The apparent concentration in this ZIP is materially inflated by the Davis County Correctional Facility at 800 W State St, Farmington — where 30 of the 59 Farmington-coded records show incarcerated status.

GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION – DISTRICT 7



Removing the institutional population, the community-residing Farmington share drops to approximately 16.0% of district registrants, broadly consistent with Layton and Kaysville. Geographic clustering in Layton (49.2% combined) reflects housing availability along the I-15 corridor — a structural outcome of affordability constraints and landlord restrictions, not an indicator of elevated community risk.

DATA SOURCES & METHODOLOGY NOTES

- All quantitative data in this profile (offense categories, age at conviction, conviction state, ZIP distribution, registry tenure, gender, attempted offenses) are derived directly from the 2026 DPS dataset for Senate District 7 (n=181), covering Davis County (Layton, Kaysville, Farmington, Centerville, South Weber) and Morgan County (Morgan city). This dataset represents confirmed, address-verified registrants.
- Compliance/recidivism figures (89.0% compliant, 11.0% recidivated) and community residency figures (83.4% active, 16.6% incarcerated) are derived directly from 2026 DPS status codes for confirmed District 7 registrants. The elevated incarcerated share is largely attributable to Davis County Correctional Facility-coded records in Farmington (84025), where 30 of 59 Farmington-coded registrants carry incarcerated status; removing the institutional population, the community-residing share is approximately 98.7%. The DPS status code measures: a subsequent sex offense conviction, not any subsequent criminal contact.
- Out-of-state convictions originate from 12 states, led by California (9), Nevada (3), and Oregon (2). Two registrants carry military convictions (UCMJ). Federal convictions represent 3.3% of the district dataset. Some out-of-state and military statutes have no direct Utah equivalent; Utah applies registrability criteria uniformly regardless of originating jurisdiction.
- Risk tier (Static-99R or actuarial classification) data is not accessible from public sources. Reserved pending potential data-sharing with UDC or UCJC.
- UTRSOL is available to brief District 7 data in detail.

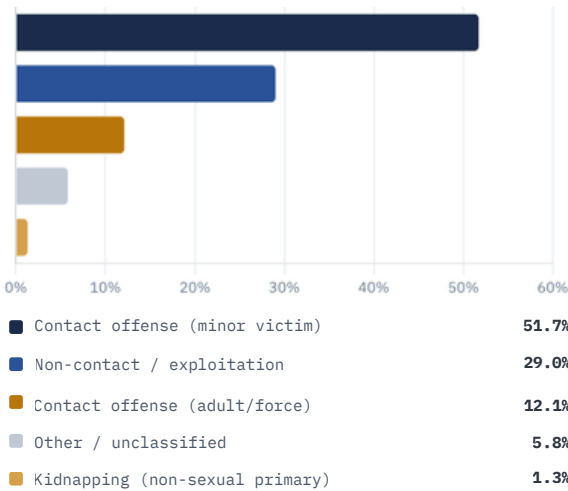

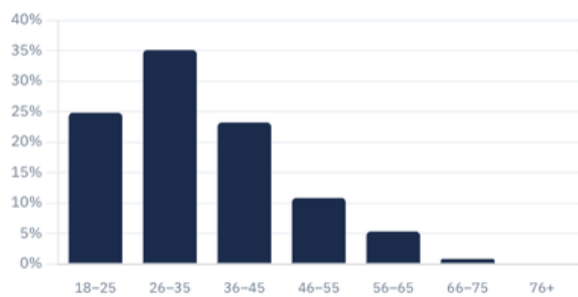

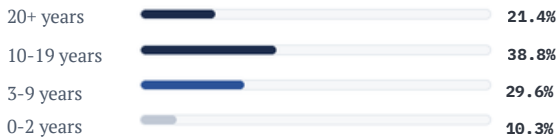

Longest single tenure: 46 years (two registrants: one incarcerated at WCCF since a 1980 California conviction, one with a 1980 Texas board-ordered designation). 60.2% of District 3's confirmed registrants have been on the registry for a decade or more; 81 individuals (21.4%) have been registered for 20 or more years.

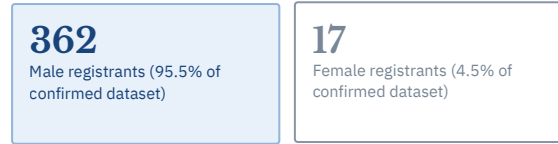

CONVICTION ORIGIN



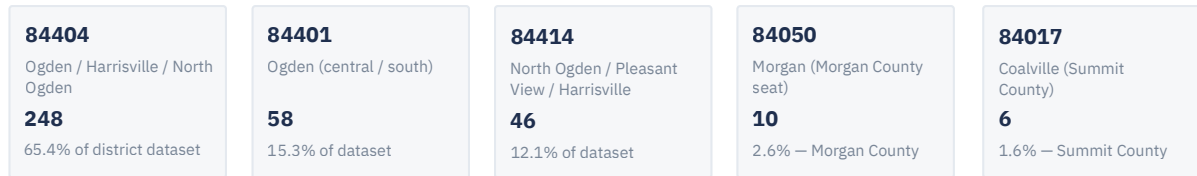

Utah applies registrability criteria uniformly regardless of originating jurisdiction's offense definitions.

GENDER COMPOSITION



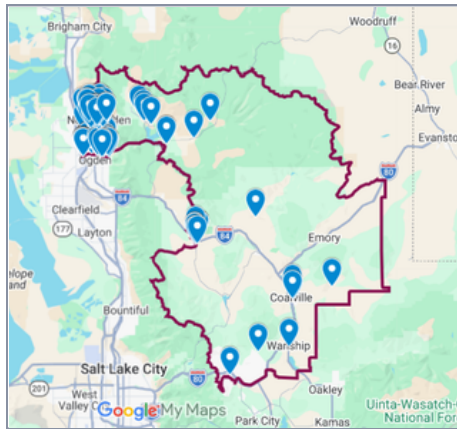
District 3 has the largest absolute female registrant count in the LECJ series (n=17). Female offense categories include: forcible sexual abuse (76-5-404), child abuse (76-5-109/109.2), sexual exploitation (76-5-201), aggravated sexual abuse of a child (76-5-404.1), near-peer conduct (76-5-401.2), lewdness (76-9-702.5), and out-of-state convictions (Wyoming, Arkansas, Tennessee).

DISTRICT GEOGRAPHY



Note on 84404 concentration: The 84404 ZIP accounts for 65.4% of the confirmed dataset, but this figure includes 39 records coded to 1400 Depot Drive — the Weber County Correctional Facility (WCCF).

GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION — DISTRICT 3



Removing the institutional population, the community-residing 84404 share drops to approximately 54.5% of district registrants. The combined Ogden corridor (84404 + 84401) accounts for 80.7% of all district registrants, consistent with housing availability patterns identified in UTRSOL's broader housing dataset. Morgan County (2.6%) and Summit County (1.9% combined) are sparsely represented relative to their geographic share of the district.

DATA SOURCES & METHODOLOGY NOTES

- All quantitative data in this profile (offense categories, age at conviction, conviction state, ZIP distribution, registry tenure, gender, attempted offenses) are derived directly from the 2026 DPS dataset for Senate District 3 (n=379), covering Weber County (Ogden, North Ogden, Harrisville, Pleasant View, Eden, Huntsville), Morgan County (Morgan), and Summit County (Coalville, Park City fringe).
- Offense categorization was performed by UTRSOL using statute descriptions from the DPS dataset. "Non-contact / exploitation" includes sexual exploitation of a minor, child pornography, enticing a minor, voyeurism, lewdness, indecent exposure, and electronic/online solicitation offenses. "Attempted" counts include any record with an attempted conviction among listed charges.
- Compliance/recidivism figures (90.8% compliant, 9.2% recidivated) and community residency figures (89.4% active, 10.6% incarcerated) are derived directly from 2026 DPS status codes for confirmed District 3 registrants. The elevated incarcerated share reflects records coded to the Weber County Correctional Facility (WCCF, 1400 Depot Drive, Ogden); removing the institutional population, the community-residing share is approximately 98.8%. 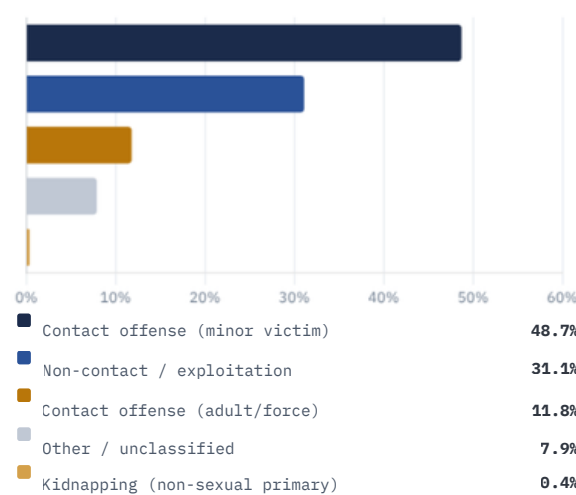

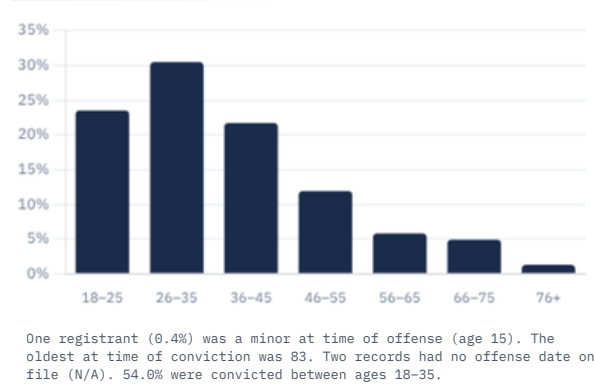

OFFENSE COMPOSITION – DISTRICT 29 (N=230)



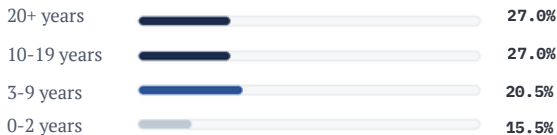

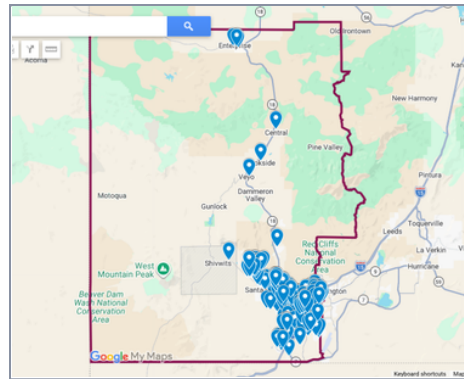

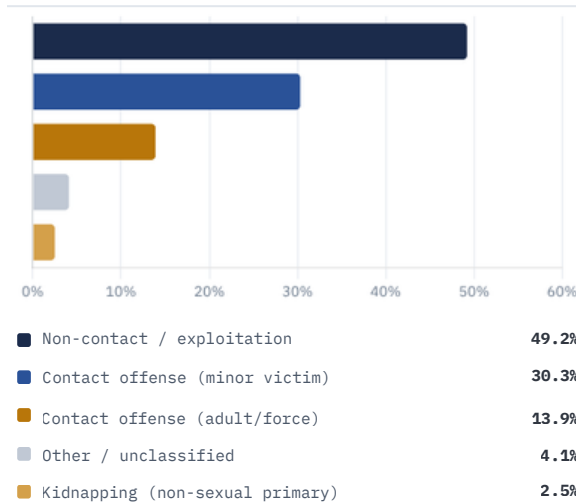

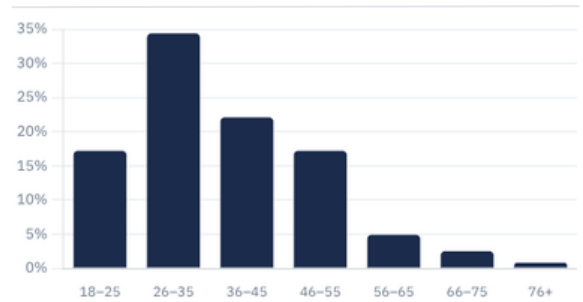

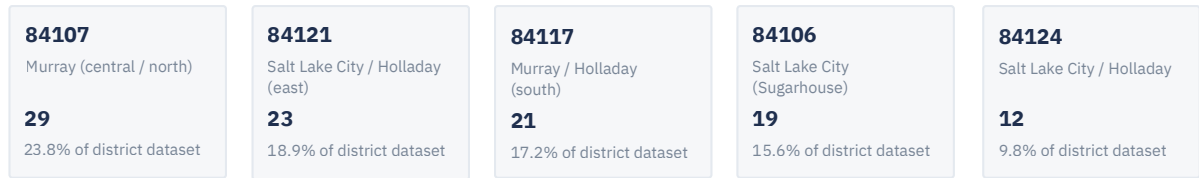

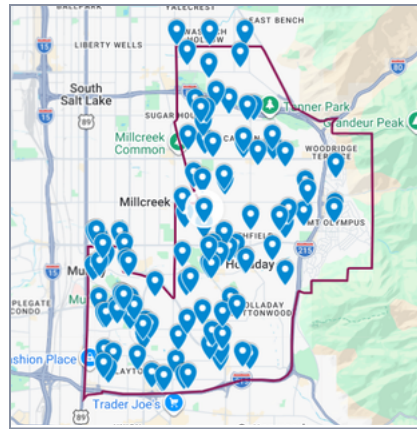

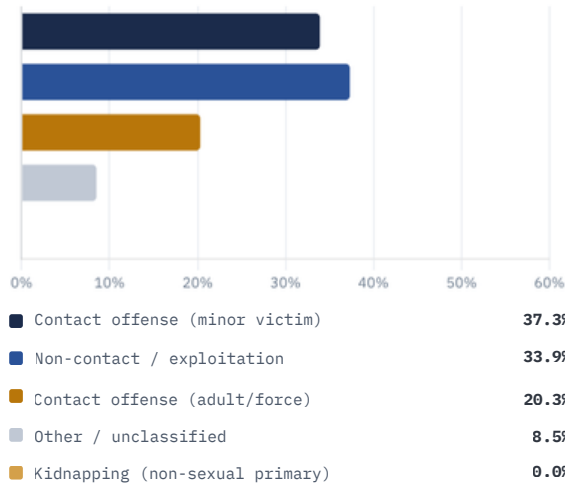

AGE AT TIME OF CONVICTION (N=59)

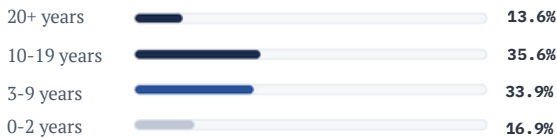

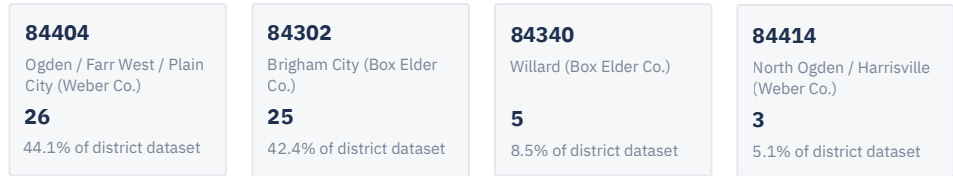

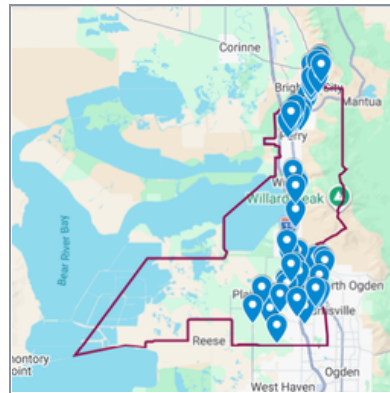

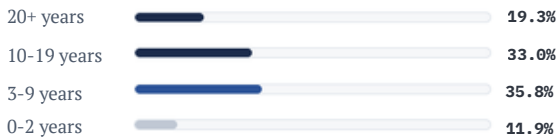

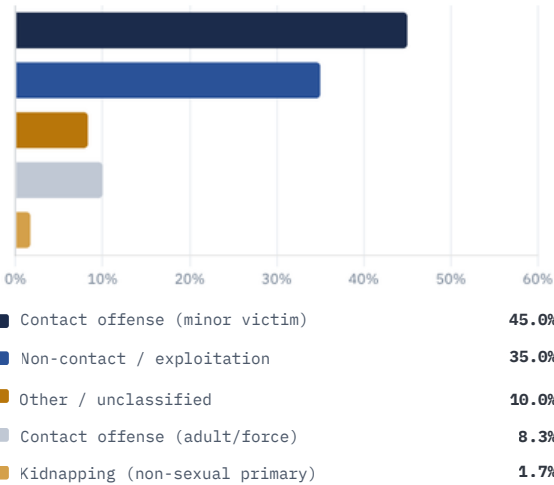

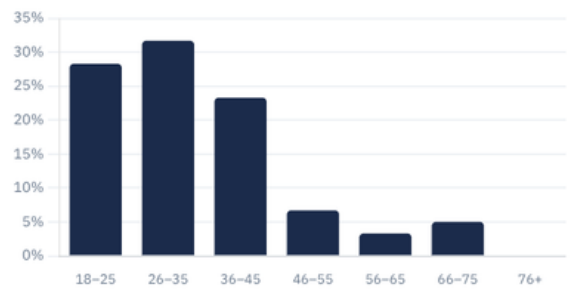

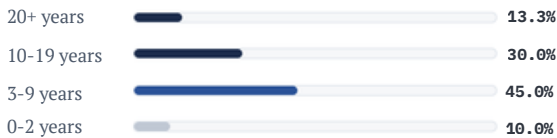

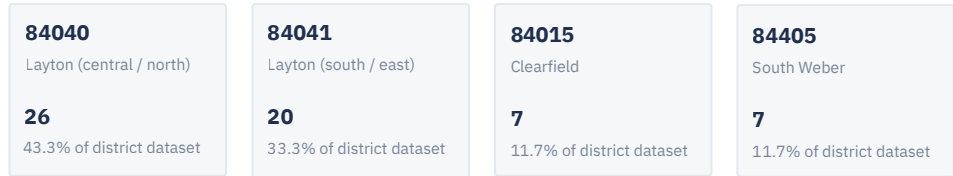

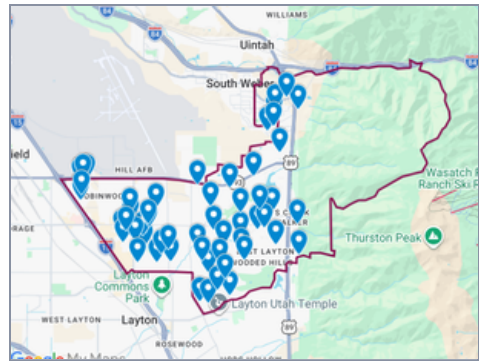

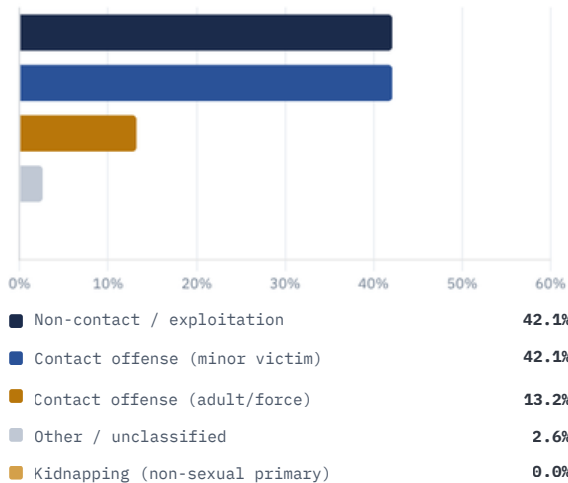

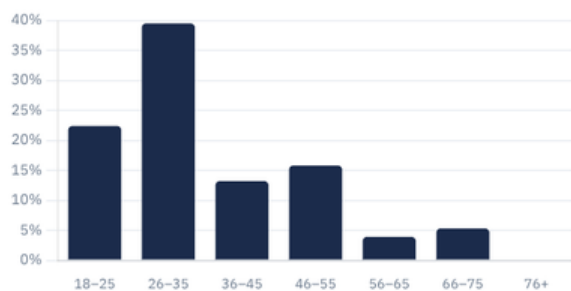

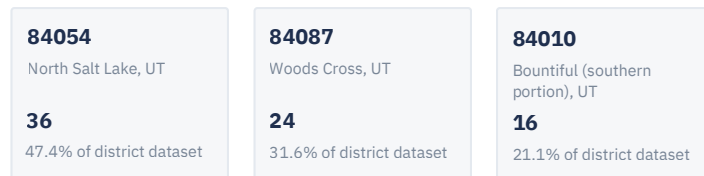

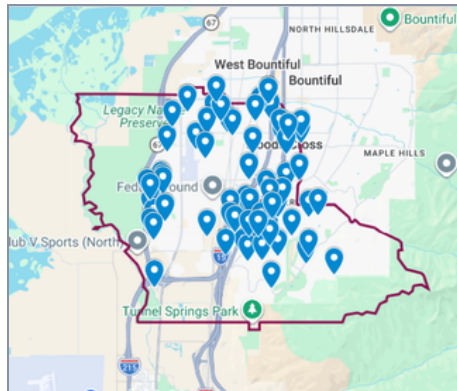

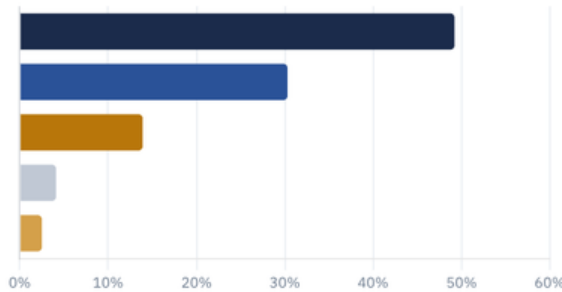

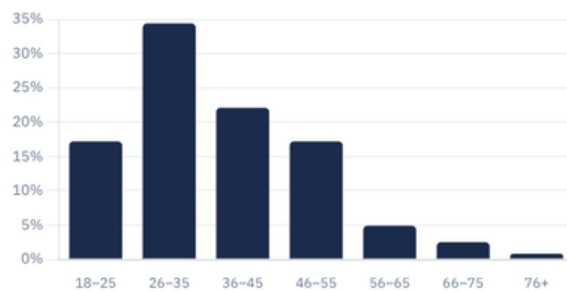

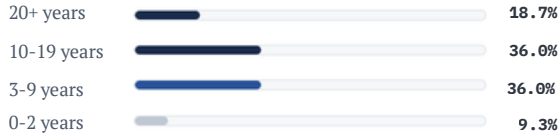

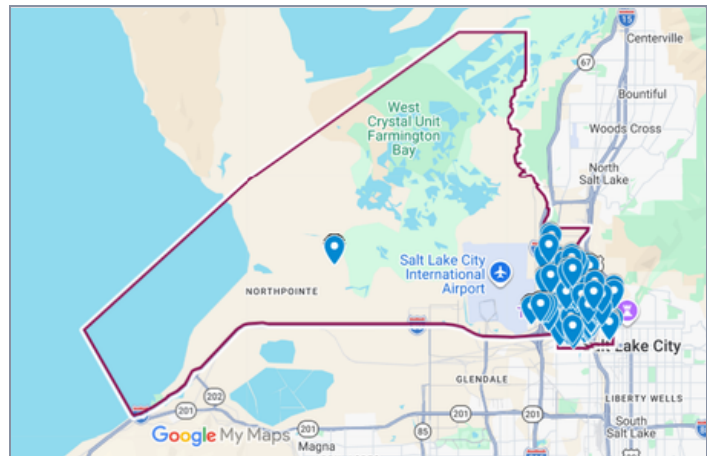

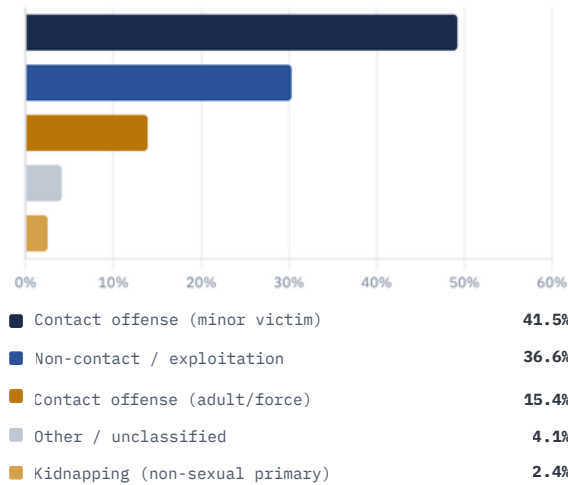

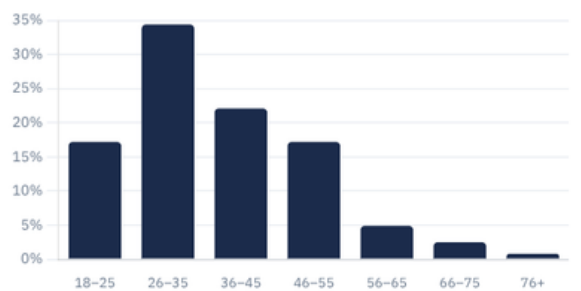

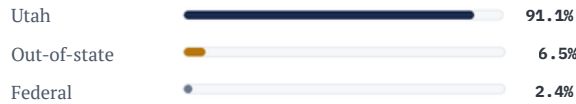

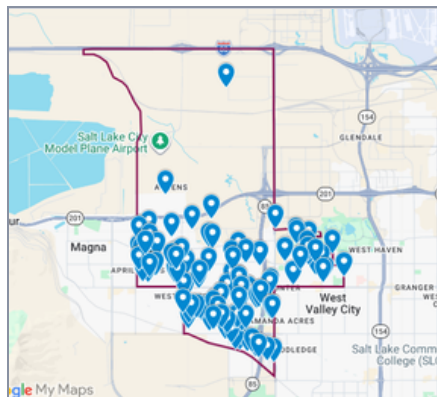

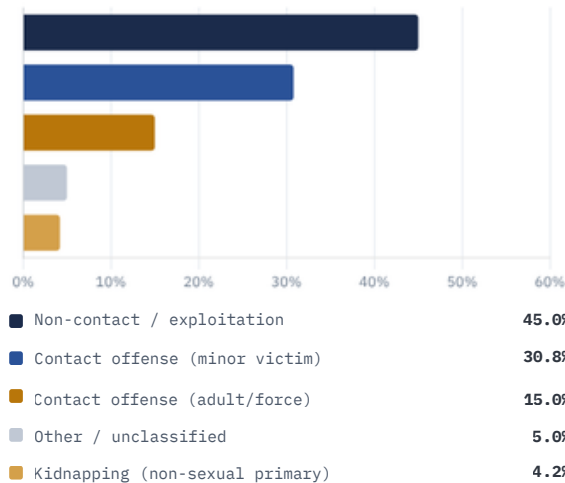

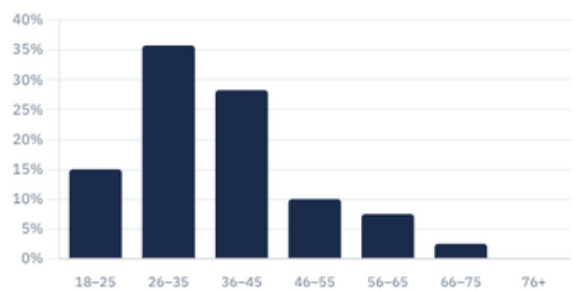

AGE AT TIME OF CONVICTION (N=44)

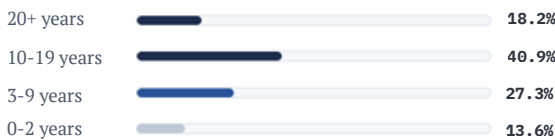

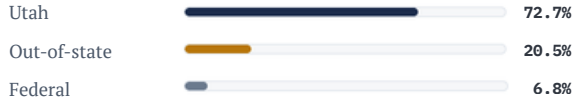

Longest single tenure: 45 years, representing registration predating Utah's current registry statute. 59.1% of District 47's confirmed registrants have been on the registry for a decade or more; 8 individuals (18.2%) have been registered for 20 or more years.

CONVICTION ORIGIN



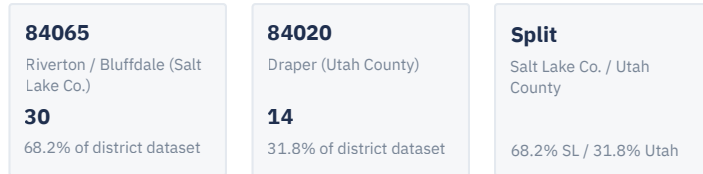

GENDER COMPOSITION



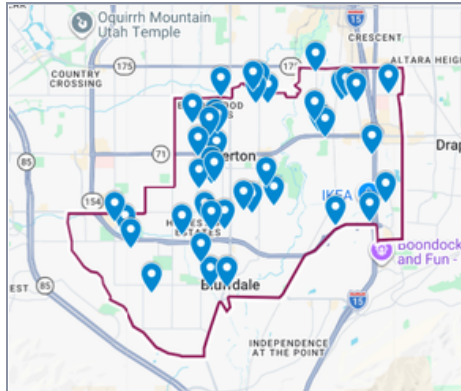
At 6.8%, HD47 has the highest female registrant percentage in the LECJ series by proportion. All 3 female registrants are on Active status. All 44 district registrants are community-residing — 0% incarcerated — with complete recidivism coding for all 44 records (41 compliant / 3 recidivated, no counting artifact).

HD47 is the most geographically compact district in the LECJ series — 100% of registrants fall within two ZIPs (84065 Riverton/Bluffdale, 84020 Draper), with no secondary clusters.

The district spans the Salt Lake/Utah County line, with 68.2% of registrants in the Salt Lake County portion (Riverton, Bluffdale) and 31.8% in the Utah County portion (Draper). Geographic distribution in HD47 reflects the district's high owner-occupancy rates and large single-family housing stock, with registered individuals concentrated in the most affordable segments of an otherwise high-income corridor.

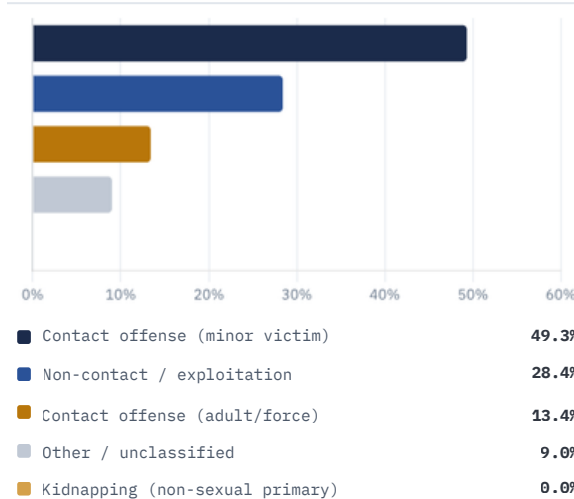

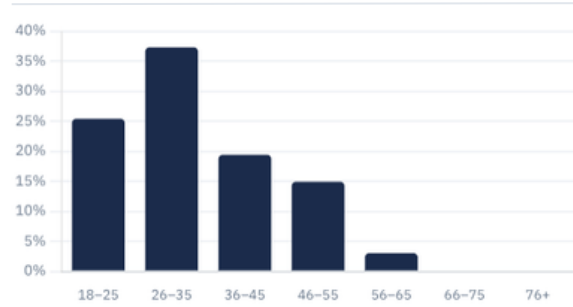

No registrants were 66 or older at offense. One registrant's conviction date is 11/19/2025, reflecting a very recent registration. 62.7% were convicted between ages 18-35.

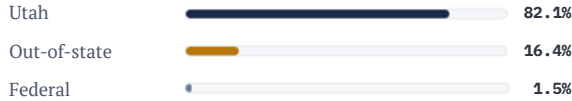

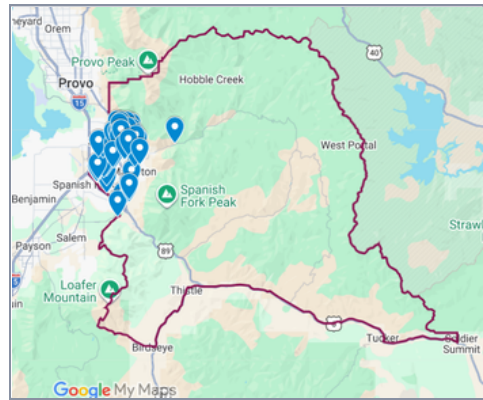
